THE VISIT AND ITS AFTERMATH

ome weeks have now passed since the World Meeting of Families and the visit of Pope Francis. Maybe it is time to begin an initial reflection on the experience and start looking at possible ways to respond to the many challenges that he gently, but firmly, set before us.

Very many of us will have particular personal and poignant memories of those days. It may be the feeling of tears welling up within us as we first set eyes on Francis in person- or it may be that sense of solidarity and togetherness that many of us experienced at the RDS for the World Meeting of Families and at the various moments when Pope Francis was present. That sense of togetherness and community was very tangible and in evidence as pilgrims journeyed together over those days. There was a sense that not only was it alright to be a Catholic but that in fact it was a good place to be, and in saying that it in no way lessens in any way my own personal esteem and respect for people of other faiths and none.

The simplicity of Francis's lifestyle is very striking too, from the modest style of car that he used to some of the places he visited, such as Our Lady of Lourdes Parish in Sean McDermott St. and the Capuchin Day Centre for the Homeless and Needy. In these visits he reminded us of very

In reminding us of the great value that is family life he reminded us that there is no such thing as a perfect family dropping straight from Heaven. No,


each family is a work in progress. In the ceremony with the young couples in the Pro- Cathedral, he underlined the importance of Christian marriages as a great blessing but also as a challenge for each couple. It is clear to me from everything that Pope Francis does and says that in his vision of the Church, there is a place for everybody. Everybody is welcome and what is true for Francis is also true for out Parishes as well.

His meeting with the Survivors of Abuse, I feel, will have done much to bring home the sheer seriousness of the issues involved and the need for a world-wide Church response at the very highest levels to it. The day for anything less than total root and branch response to the crisis is long since passed.

Archbishop Diarmuid Martin invites each faith community – each parish and each person to reflect on the experience of the visit and the World Meeting of Families and to look at creative ways to renew and strengthen our faith in Jesus Christ and our witness to Him is an opportunity not to be missed. Pope Francis states that (56) "it is one thing to be understanding of human weakness and the complexities of life, and another to accept ideologies that attempt to sunder what are inseparable aspects of reality, let us not fall into the sin of trying to replace the Creator. We are creatures, and are not omnipotent. Creation is prior to us and must be received as a gift. At the same time, we are called to protect our humanity, and this means, in the first place, accepting it as it was created."





Archbishop Diarmuid Martin asks parishes to reflect on the renewal of the Church after the **World Meeting of Families**

rchbishop Diarmuid Martin has asked each parish in the Archdiocese of Dublin to carry out a preliminary consultation on how to proceed with Church renewal after the World Meeting of Families.

Speaking at Mass in Dublin's Pro-Cathedral on 3rd of September, Archbishop Martin noted that what was involved was not a political style consultation, but a call to each believer and faith community radically to interiorise what the challenge of faith in Jesus entails in our contemporary culture.

Archbishop Martin said each parish and parish community can find its own path of reflection, with the help of the Parish Pastoral Council. "The idea is to gather as wide a variety of ideas as possible and not simply repeat the ideas of one or other group and so begin to set out a realistic agenda for renewal of the Church in the years to come," he said.

The Archbishop stressed the importance of addressing questions about faith. "Why are we no longer captivating so many of our young people for the message of Jesus Christ? Which models of pastoral activity and reflection are most likely to win the hearts of young people for the message of Jesus? How do we teach young people about prayer? How can our parishes respond to these challenges? Which aspects of our dominant culture make it harder for people to understand the message of Jesus? I am thinking, for example, about a widespread individualism that invades everything from personal life to our economic vision."

> Archbishop Martin said "The question now arises: where do we go forward now in the challenge of renewing the faith we carry in our own hearts and renewing the life of the Church?"

> > Parishes have been asked to begin this reflection around in the period of the Feast of Saint Laurence O'Toole. The feast of Saint Laurence O'Toole, Patron Saint of the Archdiocese, is on November 14th.

Ruah Choir leader Trish Nolan On community and pilgrimage...

n early morning 7am alarm on a Sunday morning and the sound of rain pelting on the window gave rise to some second thoughts (and a few groans) about taking the long trek to the Phoenix Park with the Ruah Choir in Ballyroan for the Pope's Mass – and yet I'm so glad I did!

We had decided as a group earlier in the summer to participate with the 3000 strong choir that were invited to be part of the event. This involved going through a rigorous application and vetting process as well as attending a very wet and cold rehearsal in the RDS.

Early on the morning of the Pope's mass, we joined with the rest of the Ballyroan pilgrims on the Parish bus to the Phoenix Park, leaving at 8am to allow us be in our seats for rehearsals at 10:00am. There was great excitement and a wonderful sense of community as we headed off from the church - sandwiches, flasks and munchies all packed.

For me the day was all about community and pilgrimage... the walk



from our Car Park to the Phoenix Park was about 6km and in the pouring rain. Yet we walked with a sense of fun and excitement as we were greeted and encouraged by stewards and Gardai all along the route.

We arrived around 10:00 am and made our way to the choir seats just to the left of the altar, to quickly discover the Marquee behind us that served hot tea and coffee (which we drank with relish along with Ethan Proudfoot's homemade chocolate orange biscuits made specially for us). There was a wonderful sense of community as we mixed with other choirs who had made similar (and longer) treks to the park.

My sense of the day was of community... we shared food



with each other (and those around us), we sang along to Daniel O Donnell as we waited for the Pope to arrive, we laughed and we cried, we sang and we listened. I could really see and understand the parable of the loaves and fishes as I ate biscotti, given to me by the lady from Bayside who wanted me to have Italian biscuits because the Pope was in town. There was particular delight to discover the choir sitting behind us were from Balbriggan – we told them of their good fortune as Fr. Brendan becomes their Parish Priest.

After Mass, which in itself was wonderful to be part of, we made the long walk back to our bus – and the sense of community and pilgrimage remained. I witnessed the best of human nature as people offered to help push wheelchairs and prams up through the hills in Chapelizod. There were smiles and friendly words all around and despite the tiredness and the blisters, good humour, community and kindness prevailed. So...a wonderful day was had by all! Would I do it again? ... in a heartbeat.

uring the recent World Meeting of Families, we volunteered to accommodate a visiting family. We were blessed with a husband, wife and daughter from Ethiopia, Fanuel, Neghist and Fixir. They were wonderful proud Catholics. Neghist is a paediatrician who now works for the UN as an expert in Drugs Education and associated diseases. Fanuel is an engineer in hydrology. Their 16 year old daughter is a student at the French Lycée in Adis Ababa. An older daughter and son are both studying medicine. They are very active in their parish. Neghist volunteers with the Sisters of Mother Teresa who operate a mother and baby home for young single mothers. They know many Irish missionaries and lay volunteers working in Ethiopia especially from the Daughters of Charity and the Vincentian Order. They attended most of the sessions in the RDS, attended Croke Park and made the arduous journey to the Papal Mass. They loved shopping and added greatly to their luggage for the return journey. We had wonderful discussions and conversations about Ethiopia and its religions and politics and also about our own little island and the many challenges we face. Ethiopia has a population of over 100 million people. Over fifty percent of the population are Christian of the Greek Orthodox church. There are about one million Catholics. They arrived very early on Sunday 19th August and transferred on the 27th to another family in Ballinteer. That lady has worked on many occasions in Ethiopia and is very involved in the Vincentian missionary outreach in Ethiopia. At a time in our own country when we tend to be despondent with all the media negativity about our church it was wonderful and heartening to meet people from far off countries who continue to receive support in their faith, in education, medical and health matters from wonderful committed religious, priests, sisters and lay volunteers from this country. They were very impressed with all the friendly Irish people they met during their visit. We have been invited to visit their beautiful country. They are very insistent. Our experience of sharing our home with this beautiful family made the events in the RDS, Croke Park and the Papal Mass more meaningful and enriching for us.

Churchtown Scripture Study Group

There is a huge need today for parish-based formation in the faith for adults, and the Churchtown Scripture study group is working to meet that need.

Adult Study of the Catechism of the Catholic Church in the Good Shepherd parish started as a "Year of Faith" project in 2012 and developed following a chance encounter with Mairin Ni Shuilleabhain of Cork at the Catechism stall in the RDS during the Eucharistic Congress that year.

That meeting led to follow-up work after the Congress with Mairin and others and led us to offering a Catechism course locally that autumn. We attracted twenty-five people for the course, mainly from Churchtown and Rathfarnham, with one or two from neighbouring parishes. Fr Gerard Young, who was based in The Good Shepherd parish at the time, was our spiritual director.

At the end of the Catechism course, people expressed a desire to study aspects of our faith in greater detail. We began to study the Mass and used a book recommended by Elizabeth Garvey of Rathfarnham, *Going to Mass. Becoming the Eucharist We Celebrate*, by Jim McManus C.Ss.R.

At the conclusion of the study of the Mass, people said they would like to have a deeper knowledge of the Scriptures. Fr. Christopher Fox, a member of St. Joseph's Society for Foreign Missions (often called Mill Hill Missionaries) joined us as spiritual director at that stage. We started with St. Mark and

continued through Matthew, Luke and John, covering each in twelve sessions. We run two twelve week sessions each year, Mid September to mid December and mid January to mid April. The popular choice for September 2018 is "The Acts of the Apostles" which will be the 13th twelve week programme to be undertaken, in a time span of around six years.

The study group provides participants with a great opportunity to study the Scriptures and to understand the beauty of the faith. As one group participant, Yvonne Luven, put it, 'the Catechism class opened my eyes to the depth and width of our common Christian heritage, and the books of the New Testament are an inexhaustible source of inspiration'. According to another member, Alex Miller, 'studying as opposed to reading a topic helps us to understand it better and make it our own, while studying with a group gives us the benefit of discussion'. Helen Kearns adds that 'by participating in the Faith Formation study group, I have come to a greater appreciation and understanding of the gift of my Catholic faith and this has helped to deepen my relationship with the person of Jesus Christ.' She adds that 'new avenues are constantly opening up and presenting themselves but that we can never say that we have arrived'.

Meetings are held in Churchtown parish centre on Thursday evenings from 7.30pm to 9.30pm, with a short coffee break after an hour. We work with a Spiritual Director and a Facilitator. New members, and particularly young people, are most welcome to join us, the opening session took place on Thursday 13th September.

"When you add up all the categories of victims, you can see that the number was immense. We still only know the identity of some. It is not something that belongs to the past but a hurt that survivors and those close to them carry in their hearts every day of their lives.

Let us pray for those who still suffer the effects of abuse. Let us pray for the lonely, the abandoned, those without hope. Let us pray for those who are without a home. Let us pray for those who are hurt because the Church does not adequately recognise their dignity. Let us pray for all families."

On Sunday 23rd September 2018, Diocesan Safeguarding Day was marked in each of the 199 parishes of the Archdiocese of Dublin.

The Archdiocese of Dublin values and encourages the participation of children and young people in parish liturgies and diocesan activities. Safeguarding is about creating an environment that facilitates such involvement so that children can grow strong in their faith as they experience the love of Jesus in his Church. Everyone who ministers in the parish is a representative of the Church and must observe safeguarding practices and guidelines. Good safeguarding practice is integral to ministry – it is not an optional extra.

Local safeguarding representatives will address parishes throughout the Archdiocese this weekend. They are women and men who work with the Parish Pastoral Council to ensure that diocesan safeguarding policies and practices are followed in parishes. Safeguarding is all the things we do to ensure that children and vulnerable adults are protected from harm. Parish safeguarding representatives are trained for this role and access advice and support from the Diocesan Child Safeguarding and Protection Service.

We know from sad and bitter experience that the Church in Dublin has not always been a safe place for children. Archbishop Martin is deeply grateful to all the priests, parish sisters, deacons, parish pastoral workers, staff and volunteers who have worked with great dedication in order to change this and to make our parishes and diocesan agencies safer places for children and vulnerable adults.

2018 saw the introduction of the updated Diocesan Safeguarding Statement. This document clearly outlines the policies and procedures that all parishes must have in place to safeguard children.

In order to keep all children and vulnerable adults safe, the following measures are in place in all parishes in this Diocese:

- Adopting a child-centred approach, valuing children and demonstrating our respect for them.
- Obtaining the consent of parents for the involvement of their children in parish activities.
- Choosing carefully those who work with children and vulnerable adults in our parishes.
- Ensuring parish workers and volunteers behave appropriately towards children and vulnerable adults.
- Making proper arrangements for activities involving children, including ensuring adequate adult supervision of such activities.
- Keeping good records of parish activities involving children.

The Diocesan Child Safeguarding and Protection Office works with civil authorities including the Gardaí, Tusla and the HSE.

Anyone who has a concern for the safety or welfare of a child or vulnerable adult should contact the Child Safeguarding and Protection Service. People can also take such concerns directly to the following civil authorities:

- Gardaí, in an emergency
- Tusla, the Child and Family Agency, if the concern relates to a child
- HSE, if the concern relates to a vulnerable adult

Penitential Act of Pope Francis – Phoenix Park, Dublin, Sunday 26th August 2018

"Yesterday I met with eight persons who are survivors of the abuse of power, the abuse of conscience and sexual abuse. In reflecting on what they told me, I wish to implore the Lord's mercy for these crimes and to ask forgiveness for them.

We ask forgiveness for the cases of abuse in Ireland, the abuse of power, the abuse of conscience and sexual abuse on the part of representatives of the Church. In a special way, we ask forgiveness for all those abuses that took place in different kinds of institutions directed by men and women religious and other members of the Church. We also ask forgiveness for cases in which many minors were exploited for their labour.

We ask forgiveness for all those times when, as a Church, we did not offer to the survivors of any type of abuse compassion and the pursuit of justice and truth by concrete actions. We ask forgiveness.

We ask forgiveness for some members of the hierarchy who took no responsibility for these painful situations and kept silent. We ask forgiveness.


We ask forgiveness those children who were taken away from their mothers and for all those times when so many single mothers who tried to find their children that had been taken away, or those children who tried to find their mothers, were told that this was a mortal sin. It is not a mortal sin; it is the fourth commandment! We ask forgiveness.

May the Lord preserve and increase this sense of shame and repentance, and grant us the strength to ensure that it never happens again and that justice is done. Amen."
