Holy Land



n October there is an opportunity undertake a pilgrimage to the Holy Land with parishioners from our three parishes led by Fr Martin. The Holy Land has been a place of pilgrimage from the early fourth century. The key catalyst for this was with the conversion of the Emperor Constantine to Christianity in 313. Constantine brought to his new faith concepts of sacred places and sacred buildings. Although he never visited Jerusalem himself, the Emperor instituted an extensive building programme in Palestine and his mother Helena oversaw the 'recovery' of a number of important Christian sites. Great churches were built - on the site of the 're-discovered' tomb of Christ, on the Mount of Olives and in Bethlehem. A 'Holy Land' emerged, creating a new sacred geography which offered an added dimension of spiritual experience.

Pilgrimage was an act of penance in the Middle Ages, proof of devotion but also a holiday. It united rich and poor. While the pilgrim renounced worldly comforts, the shrines that he or she passed shown with precious reliquaries and splendid works of art.

Pilgrimage has also been defined as "a meaningful journey to a place of spiritual significance" and the practice is almost as old as history. In Ireland the pilgrim journey has strong historic resonance with early Christians coming to Clonmacnoise; medieval penitents journeying to Lough Derg and Glendalough, while others visited Skellig Michael or climbed Croagh Patrick.

s I write, April 3rd, the total number of people so far identified as having contracted the Coronavirus in the Republic of Ireland stands at 3,849 with 402 new cases yesterday and with 98 people deceased and Northern Ireland has 904 cases with 48 deaths. Sadly, by the time you will read this message in the next few days or so, these numbers will likely have soared greatly.

For all of us, this is a time of great stress, anxiety and worry, unparalleled in the life-time of even the oldest of us. Our first thoughts and prayers are very much with all those whose lives have been touched by the virus and particularly the families of all those who have lost loved ones. We recognise, too, that the lives of our entire island are being impacted severely by this pandemic; just consider the loss of so many incomes with job losses, the need to have a virtual shut down of normal life. Our economy, just about getting back into its stride after the last recession, will take a long time to recover.

In the midst of these very difficult days we need to be the people of **HOPE**. The signs of **HOPE** are very evident all around us. Just think for a few moments about the enormous goodwill, good humour and generosity that is being shown by so many right across the spectrum of life; think of the great sense of community and solidarity that is very evident.

Can any good come out of such a plague? (Did we not all think that plagues were only items of history – but not of our time!). For me, at least, the first lesson to be learned from this crisis is how very fragile is our hold on human life itself. We are not masters of all we survey, even if at times we behave as though we are. Secondly, even though we would never ever wish a crisis of such magnitude on the human family, this time is causing many people to pause, to reflect, to re-evaluate life afresh and maybe change some directions.

In a manner of speaking the suffering and death of the Holy Week has come well ahead of time this year with the Coronavirus. At the heart of Holy Week is the person of Jesus Christ who remind us that he came into the world so that we might have life and have it in all its fullness. Throughout our history, our faith in him and His Blessed Mother, have seen our people safely come through many a crisis. We are resilient people. Please God, all will be well.

Please keep safe, follow the guidelines, look out for one another and a blessed Easter to you all.

oreto Primary School, Grange Road, Rathfarnham was the first of 72 schools in the country to open a capsule which had been buried by students 24 years ago.

1995 was the European Nature Conservation Year and Students from Loreto Primary School, Grange Road and Loreto Grammar School Omagh joined together to take part in the Project. It was lovely to have the girls from Omagh in 1996 as the Good Friday Agreement was not signed until two years later. Having students from Northern Ireland back then was important in building bridges.

Both Schools came together in February 1996 to bury copies of letters, photographs, newspaper cuttings, and their views on what life might be like in 2020. The time capsule held predications and a vision for the future from not only the students but other contributors including Cardinal Cathal Daly RIP. Archbishop Eames Armagh, Bishop Eamonn Walsh our area Bishop, Gay Byrne RIP, Lady in Waiting to the Queen, Joe Duffy, Seamus Heaney RIP to name a few. Other contributors were students, staff, parents, past pupils and Loreto Sisters. President Mary Robinison was there in 1996 to help bury the capsule.

31st January 2020 was a wonderful day of celebration and anticipation as the capsule was opened. Thankfully all enclosures survived in wonderful condition. There was also a tape with interviews. The Class of 1996 interviewed Teachers, our organist Ms Marie Cruise and our former parish Priest Fr. Joe Hanlon RIP.

Past pupils from both schools attended on the day and were welcomed by the Student Council and entertained by the Fourth Classes with a song Forever Loreto and a Loreto Rap.We all processed out to the burial site of the Capsule cheered on by the 500 Present Pupils.

As part of the Celebrations there was a prayer service. Candles were lit in memory of Deborah Denby RIP, past-pupil of the Class of 1996 from Loreto Grange Road and parishioner of Rathfarnham, who had died. Another candle was lit for Sheryl Heaney RIP, past-pupil of the Class of 1996 from P8 Loreto Omagh and her sister Tara who had died. A third candle was lit in memory of all past teachers, parents and pupils of Loreto.

It was truly a wonderful celebration and walk down memory lane and a wonderful feeling of "once a Loreto girl always a Loreto girl".

Hurricane Ciara

n Saturday night, February 8th the strong winds of hurricane Ciara visited Rathfarnham and in particular the parish house on Willbrook Road. The wind caused the majestic Monkey Puzzle tree (Araucaria araucana) to crash on Fr. Martin's side of the house and caused considerable damage to the upper portion of the house both outside and inside. Thankfully while there were several people in the house at the time nobody was injured.



Some initial work to repair the exposed part of the roof has already been done, but all the internal repairs and redecoration remains to be done post Coronavirus. The cost is substantial, but I guess that is one of the reasons why we take out insurance.

It has left a mess and some inconvenience but in the light of the crisis we are living with at this time it is a relatively minor matter. Finally, may I say a very special thank you to those parishioners who came to my aid that evening and the following days to help make the house habitable again.
